Proposed Disposal of Land at Courtmead Road, Cuckfield

#### 1. SCOPING

### 1.1 What are the aims of the policy, service/service change or contract?

The Council owns a parcel of land located at the end of Courtmead Road. The Council wishes to sell this land to raise capital to meet the Council's strategic objectives but in particular to secure the future of all the Council's assets, especially community facilities, and to support local economic development for the benefit of all Mid Sussex residents.

# 1.2 Who does the service/policy/contract affect? Who are the main customers (internal or external)?

The Council has not formally made this space available for use to the local community, or community group and the public have been excluded from the site since December 2013. The Council is aware that some groups have in the past made some informal use of the land. Therefore, disposal of the land may potentially affect anyone who has in the past used this land.

## 1.3 What equality information is available, including any evidence from engagement and analysis of use of services

Cuckfield Parish Council has in the past opposed the loss of this land as open space as it contends that it has been used by young people, especially a pre-school nursery and a youth club group. There is a record of MSDC Cabinet members having met with the parish council some years ago to consider the availability and suitability of other land in the parish council's ownership that could be made available for use by the nursery or other users.

The Council has also appropriated this open space for planning purposes in December 2013 and received a number of objections as a result of its advertisement. The Council gave due consideration to the individuals and groups who objected on similar grounds to that of the parish council.

## 1.4 What does this information tell us about the equality issues associated with the service and implications for the protected groups?

Although the land was not intended or designed to be used as open space, past information suggests that it has in practice been used in this way in a limited fashion a number of years ago. There is no record of such use since at least 2013 when the council erected fencing around the site. There would potentially be some impact on anyone who has used the land in the past, especially pre-school children and a youth club group. However, as the land has not been used for such purposes for a considerable period of time, the impact is considered to be negligible as these users have not requested further use of the land.

There has been no recorded use by any group since 2013 and it is reasonable to presume that this specific need no longer exists or those identified group have secured use of alternative sites. - Any historic loss of the use of the land by these groups needs to be balanced against the council's financial pressures, particularly those experienced following the Covid 19 crisis, and the continuing need invest in its capital assets, including parks and leisure centres which are enjoyed by the whole community. - Representations were submitted to the council following the advertisement in late 2013 to appropriate the land for planning purpose as the land was no longer required for the purpose for which it was held at the time. The Cabinet at is meeting of 23<sup>rd</sup> December 2013 considered these representations and agreed to appropriate the land as recommended in the report.
