spring 2023 issue

2022 was a busy year for your Council and, in this issue, we wanted to report back to you on the work we have done for Mid Sussex. Delivering high quality local services for residents will always be our number one priority.

This approach shapes our budget for the year ahead as well. Our budget proposes significant expansions of our garden waste and bulky waste

services as well as progressing our parks masterplans and Centre for Outdoor Sport. You can read more about both exciting projects in this edition.

Ensuring value for money is also critical. While Council Tax will increase, it will do so significantly below the rate of inflation. It will also go up by less than the Government's cap due to careful financial management. MSDC's share of Council Tax remains the third lowest of any District Council in East or West Sussex.

Finally, I would like to thank the 3,000 households who have been taking part in our trial of weekly food waste collections. The trial has been a huge success, with most residents participating regularly and over 120 tonnes of food waste being turned into clean energy in the first 12 weeks. The trial is testing how the service can work best for residents as we are keen to provide it across the whole district.

News in brief

Your Council Tax

Your council tax payments are split between the organisations that support and provide a huge range of vital services throughout the district. When you receive your bill it will list all these elements and the percentage of your monies that are allocated to them.

Recently published rates for 2023/2024 give the expected increase and an idea of what this means for a Band D property (which is the average rate).

Mid Sussex District Council **2.75%** increase, **£4.95** for the year

Sussex Police **6.67%** increase, **£15** for the year

West Sussex County Council **4.99%** increase, **£77.67** for the year

Your bill will also include an amount from your own Town or Parish Council.

To give an idea of how this works out. For each £1 of your Council Tax (for a Band D property) this would result in payment to each authority of

9p to Mid Sussex District Council

11p to Sussex Police

4p (on average) to Town and Parish Councils

76p to West Sussex County Council.

have been welcomed to their new homes. Countryside Partnerships is building 460 homes at Brookleigh, with over 50% of them as affordable housing in partnership with affordable housing provider Sage Homes.

Affordable Housing enables local people on the Housing Register who are assessed as being in priority housing need to have a home to call their own.

One of the first local people to benefit is Jemima and her two-year-old daughter Alayia.

When Jemima and her partner separated in 2022, she worried that finding an Affordable Home would take herself and daughter far from their hometown.

After Jemima and Alayia spent two weeks in emergency accommodation in Brighton and almost two months in temporary accommodation, Mid Sussex District Council found them a brand new two-bedroom apartment delivered by Sage Homes at the new settlement of Brookleigh being built between Wivelsfield station and Burgess Hill.

The 24-year-old said: "When my relationship went south, it left me needing to get a house for me and Alayia, but we had nowhere to go."

Jemima said she loves her new Affordable Rented home - especially the size of the rooms, the carpets and the décor - and Alayia has settled right in.

She said: "There's nothing in the property I don't like. I'm so happy that we have got somewhere we can call home because in the last two months I've moved four times with Alayia."

She added that the best aspect is that they stayed living in Burgess Hill - she is five minutes from her work as a dementia care support worker and a short drive from family who help to look after Alayia, who has autism.

She said: "I was quite worried we would be far from everyone, so it's the best thing in the world that my sister lives up the road and my mum is five minutes away; I'm just so happy.

"If it wasn't for this development, we probably wouldn't have been in Burgess Hill and with my family – it means a lot to me to stay locally in my own Affordable Home, and I'll be forever grateful for it."

Jemima's home is one of 237 Affordable Homes being delivered by Sage Homes at Brookleigh in partnership with developer Countryside Properties and Homes England.

All Sage Homes available for Affordable Rent at Brookleigh will be allocated by Mid Sussex District Council to people on its housing register assessed as being in priority housing need.

Later this spring Bellway will be on site to build 249 homes on land east of Isaacs Lane and at Lowlands Farm. 30% of these homes will be Affordable Housing, built alongside public open spaces and an extension to the Bedelands nature reserve.

John Sisk & Son and Jackson Civil Engineering continue their work on the link roads to the east and west of the site, which will open up access for construction traffic to new development plots for housing, schools,

neighbourhood centres and Mid Sussex District Council's Centre for Outdoor Sport.

Last autumn we successfully launched our 1-2-3 collection service trial to just over 3,000 residents within three areas of Mid Sussex. We delivered every trial property an indoor grey caddy to collect the food waste and an outdoor lockable green bin to present on their collection days. Communal properties also received their indoor caddies and a larger green communal bin in their existing bin stores.

Mid Sussex residents in parts of Ashurst Wood, Burgess Hill and Lindfield were selected to take part in the new waste collection trial to represent a mix of housing types and locations and to ensure that the trial was representative of the whole of the District. The trial will

We continue to welcome all feedback regarding the 1-2-3 trial and many residents not selected in the trial have expressed interest in the food waste collection when it is available to them.

Focus on Sustainability

In 2022 we agreed the **Sustainable Economy Strategy and Action**

Plan and set a target for Mid Sussex District Council to become NetZero by 2040 for carbon emissions the Council directly controls..

We've already begur to reduce our carbon emissions by installing PV solar

panels on our building and switching our parking enforcement fleet to electric vehicles. In the past year we have made further progress -

60 electric vehicle charge points installed in Council owned car parks.

153 applications to Warmer Homes scheme to improve home energy efficiency and reduce bills. £66,954 of grant money spent on energy efficiency improvements so far.

We worked with Solar Together as part of group buying scheme for residents to purchase solar panels and battery storage systems. Recent figures show Mid Sussex leading the installation numbers compared to other participants in Sussex with 305 homes being accepted onto the scheme (the average being 118 homes).

Supporting the **BLUE campaign** by allowing 40 sites to rewild, supporting environmental diversity.

In Burgess Hill over 3,500 metres of footways, cycle paths and bridleways enhanced to provide safe and reliable alternatives to using the car.

Trialling a '1-2-3' enhanced recycling and rubbish collection, including food waste trial collection.

Mount Noddy Recreation Ground



Funding has been agreed for the first phase of delivery for three of these plans. This phase includes full delivery of the Finches Field and Hemsleys Meadow and Mount Noddy Recreation Ground plans and delivery of parts of the Victoria Park plan. Funding has been secured developer S106 contributions, capital funding from the Council and part funding from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

We are now working on refining these plans and over the course of the next couple of months we will be re-engaging with local residents on these three sites. We are making it easier for everyone to keep up to date with all these projects via our Engagement Hub which can be found on the Council's main website.

On 8th March a public exhibition event took place at The Triangle to show plans for the new Centre for Outdoor Sport in Burgess Hill. This followed a comprehensive consultation with key user clubs from Burgess Hill, local secondary schools, over 100 potential user clubs from the wider area and relevant national governing bodies of sport.

Business matters

Going with the Flow

Finding your chosen career path can be much more complex than a clear response to the question "What do you want to be?" at school.

Opportunities for learning and development come in many shapes. We met up with James Howard, also a Mid Sussex STEM Challenge Ambassador, who took time to find the path to his successful role at Flowserve in Haywards Heath.

After GCSEs I made the decision to do A-levels. I wasn't very motivated when I did my A-levels as I didn't know what I wanted to do. I was just there to be there. But you can't just coast through A-levels and when I finished, I was disappointed at my results and didn't really know what to do next.

When I was starting out there wasn't really the opportunity for apprenticeships. There was a massive push for university – that's how it was in the mindset

of people my age, – but it isn't the best fit for everyone. Now things seem to be different, but without the A-levels I needed to go to university it threw me for a bit to have that option taken away.

I got a job at Allders Department Store but very quickly realised retail was not for me. From there I went to work with one of my old teachers. He worked with kids who had fallen out of the school system, and I joined the team in an assistant mentoring role. Kids would

come in and we would teach them basic Maths and English, do a bit of mentoring and give them a person to talk to. I'd talk to the kids about what they should be doing; – study and get a good education – and I started to realise I wasn't really practicing what I was preaching because I wasn't taking my own advice.

So, I did a bit of research and found that Brighton University offered a 1-year foundation course as a route to an engineering degree – and that's where it kicks off more positively for me. I was interested in the subject, and I had the motivation. I worked hard, went to all the lectures and started to win awards. Out of the five years I was at University I think I got awards every year.



What would you say to your 18-year old self?

That's a hard one! But I would probably say 'put effort in, do that and you will take positives from it, wherever you may eventually end up.'

My engineering degree was a sandwich course which included a one-year internship – and that internship I did at Flowserve. The internship opportunity at Flowserve has been key to my career success since, without Flowserve, I'm not sure where I would be now. That year in industry really learning how it is to be in an actual organisation and get experience was incredibly valuable. I had a really good manager, Paul, and when I finished the internship, he wanted me to do a project for Flowserve as part of my degree. So, in my final year I'd do three days a week at Uni and two days at Flowserve. I won an IMechE Award for that project (Institution of Mechanical Engineers). I went back to university to get my Masters, by which time I had already been offered a job at Flowserve, which was great for me.

James joined Flowserve full time as a staff engineer in 2015 and several promotions later is now Global Engineering Leader. For me it's been quite a big challenge, but it's been an interesting challenge and I've learned a lot, I'm still learning a lot.

James now heads up a team of engineers in the UK and globally, he is a keen advocate for internships, apprenticeship and work experience opportunities and is inspiring the next generation as a STEM Ambassador working with students at Burgess Hill Secondary Academy as part of the 2022–23 Mid Sussex STEM Challenge.

Local history

Keen eyes will be able to spot a Blue Plaque on the Flowserve office in Haywards Heath. As the office of Norris Brothers Limited the site was associated with a landmark of UK engineering history. Born in Cuckfield the brothers helped design the Bluebird hydroplane boats driven by Donald Campbell as he pushed the limits of waterspeed records in the 1950s and 60s. The brothers Lew, Ken and Eric spent more than a decade designing the "Bluebird 7" hydroplane in Haywards Heath in which Donald Campbell sadly lost his life attempting the World Water Speed Record on 4th January 1967.

Safety matters

Keep yourself safe against scammers

Sadly, scams can be difficult to spot as fraudsters find more sophisticated ways to try and get hold of people's money. Anyone can fall victim to fraud and in Mid Sussex victims are reporting more incidents of impersonator and doorstep fraud than many other types of fraud. Older residents are particularly vulnerable.

Could you help take a Stand Against Scams?

Friends Against Scams is a National Trading Standards Scams Team initiative which aims to protect and prevent people from becoming victims of scams by empowering people to take a stand against scams.

You can learn how to protect yourself and your loved ones from scams by completing the Friends Against Scams awareness session and help to raise awareness throughout your community.

Doorstep fraud occurs when someone knocks on your door and unexpectedly offers goods or services. They may try to convince you that work is required urgently and may put pressure on you to have this carried out immediately and may ask for an upfront payment. Often the work is not done or is completed to a poor standard, and you may also be overcharged for any work done.

Protect yourself:

- Always check their identity and do not let anyone into your home under any circumstances if you are suspicious. Never leave your front door open and unattended
- Take time to consider your options and don't be pressured into making a quick decision. Have the confidence to say no to cold callers if you feel pressured
- Never pay upfront for goods or services you have not received.

Impersonator fraud occurs when someone calls or messages you claiming to be from a trusted organisation such as your bank, the police, HMRC or utility or internet company. They may claim that there is an issue with your account or request assistance with an ongoing investigation and ask you to carry out a task that will ultimately involve you handing over your money. In some cases, they may send a courier to collect your card/cash/PIN number.

Protect yourself:

- Never share your PIN with anyone or provide your card details to a cold caller to make a payment
- If you received an unexpected call, hang up and use another phone to call back and confirm identity
- Never allow a cold caller remote access to your computer
- Speak to family/friends before carrying out any actions
- Trusted organisations will never ask you for your PIN or password or ask you to transfer money to a safe account.

Clair Hall update

The Council is working to secure an investment partner and cultural anchor tenant for a modern community and entertainment venue on the Clair Hall site.

It follows the decision to accept the recommendations of BOP, the cultural and creative industry experts who have been advising the project. They recommended working on two options – either a brand new building or significantly remodelling the current building.

There is a clear need for change. In a public consultation in 2021, 95% of residents said they wanted to see change and improvement.

Despite the challenging economic environment, the Council is working to deliver a cultural and leisure offer for the whole of the Mid Sussex community now and in the future, in a modern venue on the Clair Hall site. The Council is not selling the site and the interim NHS use is continuing. There will be further updates on the project during 2023.
